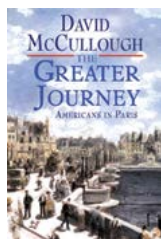
Knitting for a Cause: Library Clubs

In the fall of 2013, EPL kicked off new programming, encouraging patrons to gather in special interest groups. One of those groups, In Stitches, meets twice a month to share project ideas, tips, and tricks for improving participants' various needlecrafts. In November, American Heart Association representative Martha Elshareif asked the group to create red baby caps. 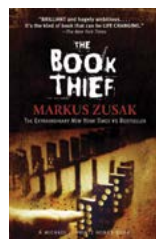

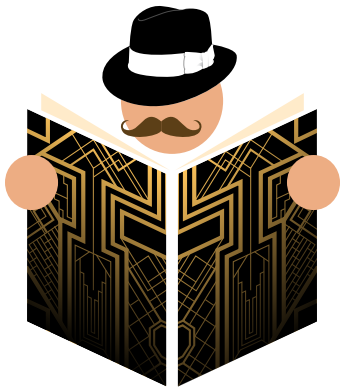

ELMHURST READS NOTORIOUS CHICAGO

Elmhurst Reads 2014

The gin-guzzling, jazz-swinging, Lindy-hopping 1920s gave rise to the most notorious era in Chicago history, and we're going to learn all about it at EPL this spring.

Our Elmhurst Reads book for 2014 is *City of Scoundrels* by Gary Krist. This book details the fateful events during a two-week period in 1919, from a dirigible crashing through the roof of a busy downtown bank to one of the worst urban riots in American history—all against the backdrop of speakeasies, jazz music, flappers, and political wrangling. Krist's crisp writing captures the tumultuous birth of the modern American city in our backyard.

We'll also be highlighting the book *Deadly Valentines* by Jeffrey Gusfield, which chronicles the story of Jack McGurn, Al Capone's notorious henchman who along with his blond alibi, Louise Rolfe, eluded the Chicago police following the St. Valentine's Day Massacre in 1929.

Early Literacy: It Begins with You!
