Director's Report

More and more patrons are visiting the Library. Door counts are up and anecdotally, when walking around, I'm seeing patrons enjoying Library spaces. Brewpoint is scheduled to re-open on August 9. Patrons and staff have missed the convenience of the café and I am pleased that they will return soon. Additionally, fall programming will be in-person with some virtual options. In-person programming has traditionally been very popular and brings many people to the Library. We are also booking meeting room spaces again. Many of our regular groups have already scheduled meetings. With the reimplementation of these services, we should see our visit counts continuing to increase.

We've received quite a few positive comments about the parking lot. The second phase, which is the drop-off area at the west entrance, is scheduled to begin on July 16. This will be much less disruptive to patrons. Hopefully the weather cooperates and it will be completed in a timely fashion.

ADULT SERVICES DEPARTMENT REPORT June 2021

New Employees in ADS and

In June, two part-time Technology Specialists started in Adult Services (ADS), John Reams and Violet Xiong.

Remote Work Ended

We also ended remote services and ADS staff are now working all hours in the building. This also means that we're answering all of our phone calls, chats, texts and zooms in the building again. It's really nice to have the team back together in one building.

Patron Interactions

While use of the floor is busy with study rooms and tables being very well used, our interactions with patrons, while increasing, remain 20% less than pre-pandemic and use of the public computers remains consistently slower than normal. Even with the computers halved for social distancing we've you can always find an open computer.

Public Service Staffing

Given the slower pace, we're continuing to staff the public floor with only 3 people (historically normal is 4 and sometimes 5 people) and holding off on requesting to fill other open positions until the pace of public service picks up significantly.

Study Rooms and Meeting Rooms

As we entered phase 5 of the pandemic, room capacities for the study rooms and the Gathering Room were raised to normal limits and their usage continued to increase rapidly. We changed the Board Room so that it is now bookable as a study room instead of a meeting room. This should allow for more efficient use of this 8-seater room which historically sat empty or was under-utilized in between meetings.

Creative Studios

Creative Studio reservations were up 50% in June to 30 reservations. This month patrons could begin using the studio without reserving ahead and we resumed normal time and capacity limits as well.

KIDS' LIBRARY DEPT REPORT

The Summer Reading program this year is utilizing a new model, in which participants are asked to read every day for 40 days and are able to choose their own daily goal. As of June 30, we have had 953 participants return their logs and collect prizes. It's such an amazing turnout so far and we can't wait to see what the end of July brings!

We're also incredibly excited to welcome two new staff members to the department – **Kelsey Wilcoxon** and **Amanda Murray**, who joined the department at the end of June.

Programs

There were mulitple activities and stations for attendees to participate in and the program ended just in time for our attendees and staff to miss the heavy rain that came right after!



Staff members have been looking for opportunities to provide pop up programs to families visiting the library. Gloria Walsh-Rock, Katie Stringwell, and Lori Hoegler have done a craft, storytime, and dance party so far and they've been well loved.

School, Scouts, & Community Outreach

School – Lori Lorenz and Gloria Walsh-Rock made two visits to Conrad Fischer in June, on the 16th and 30th. During those visits, they interacted with 782 students. Lori says, "[we] visited Conrad Fischer summer school on June 16 to see grades K-5 and promote the SRP. We shared animal trivia, jokes, and book talks as well as distributing a readers' advisory activity that came with 8 different genre book marks full of suggestions with grades 3-5. In grades K-2 we shared animal jokes and a story."

Staff Training

Lori Hoegler, Linnea Dolan, Allison Davis, and **Alea Perez** participated in **6.25 hours** of staff training and networking opportunities. Topics included upcoming fall titles, restorative practices for youth, music and literacy connections, and a visit to the Elmhurst Art Museum's In Focus: The Chicago Freedom Movement exhibit.






