DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Statistics were down quite a bit from last August but we are attributing at least a part of that to the change to the new system. The Kids' Library checked out 53 laptops and 32 iPads for in-house use during the month of August. Obviously, the kids are really enjoying having the devices available for checkout. Some kids are using the computers with the mediascape and others are just using them for singular use. Digital collections continue to increase in popularity. My Media Mall, 3M Cloud, Freegal, and Zinio are all very popular.

Kudos to all Library staff and especially the Department Head team for transitioning us to the new catalog. As of this week, we were still ironing out kinks in the system but staff remained positive and calm even when things were a bit rough. I will give a full report during unfinished business.

The Bingo program is proving to be very popular again this year. Last year, the Public Information Department devised the game to encourage patrons to use different services and technology in the Library. September is national library card sign up month so it promotes getting a card and marketing the Library to those new patrons and our current patrons. The grand prize this year is an iPad mini, donated by the Friends of the Library. Thank you Friends!

I included an article that was published in this month's *Library Journal* titled "The Library as Catalyst for Civic Engagement". It's an excellent article that talks again about the future of libraries (and by future we are talking about the next 6 years) and how libraries will need to adapt to stay relevant. I am going to distribute it to all Library staff because I believe it's so important that everyone understands the direction that public libraries are moving. This is happening now! These are not just ideas anymore, they are industry trends.



We had 104 middle school volunteers who donated 277 hours of service to the Library this month.


STAFF
