#### Director's Report

It's hard to believe but we have finished our 2013 fiscal year. Sometimes I can't believe how time flies. We accomplished much this year: catalog project, web site, AV project. Staff did an amazing job of handling all these changes and the challenges that came with them. Our statistics are down again this month; however, I need to caution you against seeing the picture as totally negative. After comparing circulation totals this year to last year, the downturn in circ is almost exclusively coming from borrowing from or sending items to other libraries. While we will continue to see decreases because we will no longer be sending out as many materials, we have been changing practices and procedures to meet our demand. It's now very evident what our patrons are asking for, and where the holes in our collection are located.

After many weeks of delays from the manufacturer, Pentegra (AV tech supplier), finally received the components needed to complete the AV project. Staff has been using some of the new technology and they are very pleased with it. We will hold classes and open houses for patrons in the very near future.

The new technology related programs being offered are going well. A sampling of the classes that staff is offering include: iPhoneograpy, Into to Social Media, Pinterest, Plan your Party Online, Wordpress, and Twitter. Patrons seem interested and attendance is growing. The Adult Services Department has been offering technology help all month. While we always offer tech help, it has been highlighted this month with a tech help campaign. I've heard that we have had entire families in with their new iPads. We also continue to help patrons to download books on new ereading devices. It's amazing to see how reference questions have changed in the past few years. While staff is still helping patrons with traditional inquiries, the amount of tech help given at the reference desk grows every year. Libraries are always changing!

The Kids' Library Winter Reading program is in full swing. Over 900 children have signed up thus far. It's exciting to see the level of participation that winter reading attracts. The Kids' Library is always doing interesting things. Look for sewing classes to be offered soon! Per the suggestion of Middle School Librarian, Kim Scott, we now own 10 sewing machines. Kim's Project Runway programs have been very popular and buying sewing machines was her idea to take fashion design at the Library to the next level. They also plan to use the machines for other programs. This goes right along with the "Library as Maker Space" idea that we are hearing about so often.

Minecraft for grades 1-5 on December 4 brought in 27 players and six attending parents. Everyone who wore a Santa hat earned a prize! Chess Club drew six players and the annual holiday card-making program drew 36 people, even though the weather that night was awful. Five students attended the "Celebrate December Holidays" program which featured food samples and customs of Hanukkah, Kwanzaa, and Christmas. LEGO Club brought in 14 builders, followed by Open LEGO which was attended by 30 kids and parents. Madcap Machines hosted by High Touch-High Tech drew 19 eager scientists. The POWS Winter Performance entertained 70 happy attendees. Sarah, Nuala, and Lori Hoegler presented a holiday storytime for 27 folks at the Elmhurst Art Museum as part of their Santa celebration on December 20.

We finished the year with a December 30 session of Drop-in Crafting which brought in 149 kids and parents. Our New Year's Eve program featuring the Caribbean sounds of Tropixplosion entertained a crowd of 118. From October through December, the Kids' Library, led by Sarah Burnside, offered interactive passive programming for young children and their parents. We posted signs encouraging kids to count things, measure things, and identify shapes throughout the Kids' Library. It was fun to see many kids and young families engaged in these activities. It is an easy way to help children interact with their surroundings while they are here, and parents appreciated the skill-building involved.

Julie Stiegmeyer presented the Library's first "Pop-up Program" by demonstrating how to cut beautiful snowflakes in the Lobby on December 4. Patrons were invited to try their hand at this holiday craft, and fourteen children, two high schoolers, and four adults accepted the invitation. A pop-up program is one that is unannounced – a drop-in program in a public area that will surprise and delight patrons.

Each month we pose a question on our display board and kids write their answers on post-it notes and stick them to the board. There are hundreds of responses each month.

#### **SCHOOL SERVICES**

We were invited to participate in Hawthorne School's Scholastic Book Fair on Thursday, December 5. Our staff presented book recommendations to the 573 students and 36 teachers who were shopping for something good to read. Mrs. Lindstrom's first grade class invited Shaira Rock to Hawthorne School on December 10 to talk about what a librarian does. Shaira was also asked to read her favorite picture book, entitled "Creepy Carrots," by Aaron Reynolds. Sarah Burnside visited Treetown Preschool on December 16 and 17, sharing stories with a total of 34 kids and teachers.


