DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Where does the time go? Another successful year has passed and I've listed some of the highlights of 2015 below.

- We completed a 1.7 million dollar renovation of the Adult Services Department, which brought
 many new amenities to the community: Teen Space, 9 new study rooms, 3D printer, fireplace,
 new display shelving, poster printer, Business Center, Creative Studios, new service desks, and a
 new computer lab.
- Programming was increased and patrons came out in droves. Programming attendance was up 30% for the year and visitor counts were up 7% for the year.
- Several new alternative collections were introduced: board games, cake pans, knitting needles and projectors.
- We added new positions: HR Specialist, Lead Technology Instructor, Adult Services Librarian, and Programming Coordinator.
- Thirty-one people celebrated milestone anniversaries at the Library.
- Board and staff completed a five year strategic plan.

It's been an exciting year and we're looking forward to a productive 2016!

The Facilities Department received the new snow sweeper just in time for the winter weather we are sure to receive. They're very grateful to be able to ride in a heated cab, protected from the elements, while keeping our sidewalks and grounds free from ice and snow. They may even be hoping for a little (just a little) inclement weather so they can try out their new machine!

The family Holiday Card Crafting program on December 12 brought in 35 folks, and on December 21, 108 snowflake-makers helped decorate our windows.

The week before the newest Star Wars movie debuted kids voted for their favorite Star Wars character. By the end of the week, 300 votes had been cast. The Kids' Chess Tournament on December 18 had 20 participants. Our first monthly Read to the Dogs program drew 19 readers. Many thanks to the volunteers who have agreed to bring their dogs here each month to help kids grow their reading skills. Two festive sessions of Reindeer Romp storytimes on December 22 brought in 102 little ones and their caregivers. A new computer game class, Agario Frenzy, drew 13 students, Open Craft Day on December 28 brought in 101 crafting families, and Movie Day on December 29 drew 19 viewers. Our New Year's Eve program, the Truly Remarkable Loon, was enjoyed by 255 people at two performances.

Elmhurst library completes second-floor renovation

Technology upgrades include new lab, more printing services

ELMHURST - Thanks to a \$1.7 million renovation on the second floor of the Elmhurst Public Library, Elmhurst residents have the opportunity to utilize new digital technologies.

The library now boasts a creative studio lab, poster printing and 3-D printing services as a result of the renovation, which was officially completed Sept. 19.

'New emerging technology can be out of reach for a lot of people because it can be challenging to use," Elmhurst Public Library Public Information Coordinator Cher Moore said. "By having it at the library, we are able to provide a service that makes it easier for patrons to use, so they can actually make items."

The creative studio lab allows library card holders access to professional equipment and software to create digital audio, visual and graphics projects. It consists of three soundproof rooms that are ready for music recording, green screen photo sessions or graphics work. Mac computers and Adobe Creative Cloud are available for producing and editing the projects.

The 3-D printer can create three-dimensional objects from a computer-generated design. Patrons can use the service by submitting an online request, but library staff operates the machine.

The 3-D printer in the last few

years definitely has become something that is more mainstream," Moore said. "This is a new type of technology and it is something that we have not been able to provide before."

The poster printer, which also is staff operated, enables people to print posters, banners and signs up to 42 inches wide and however long they need since the paper rolls are 150 feet long. Even though the service costs 50 cents per inch printed, it only covers the library's cost.

What we are doing at the library is evolving with the needs of our communities," Moore said. "We looked at what they want and need, and work to provide that.'

A main pillar of the Elmhurst Public Library strategic plan for 2016 - 2021 is to provide the support, resources and environment for patrons to engage with technology. The core technological services that the library is committed to providing are hardware, software and instruction.

During the past decade, the library has enhanced user experience with e-readers and an e-library, a catalog of digital content including books, classes, magazines, music, videos and audiobooks.

As a result, patrons can now rent content remotely from the comfort of their home or on the go.

Although the library is committed to offering a wide range of technological services, it is not a substitute for the traditional library experience.

We want to provide the technology people are asking for and have come to expect from the library but we also provide spaces," Moore said. "We have a fireplace. That was one of the things we added in the renovation. We did not anticipate building one, but we did a survey before construction and the number of people who wanted a fireplace was 30 percent higher than any other item on the survey."

According to a Library Journal article published with the rankings, for top libraries such as Elmhurst Public Library, circulation and visits per capita lead to high ratings. The best libraries also have welcoming facilities with well-targeted programs and collections with range and depth.
