I am still processing all of this but I do know that identity politics is at the core of the viciousness that is increasingly dividing our country. Steve Bannon wants Republicans to move to the right. Elizabeth Warren wants Democrats to move to the left. They are both wrong. Deeply wrong. My favorite historian, Shelby Foote, said that the genius of the American people was our ability to compromise. How can we compromise when we are being told to flee to the fringes, the margins, so that the divide between us becomes a chasm?

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In Edition #76 of this newsletter I wrote that Vladimir Putin's approach to foreign policy follows an important concept from Sun Tzu in "the Art of War" [ i.e. "know your opponent thoroughly before you take any action"]. Recently I was reading Tom Ricks' blog "Best Defense" and he quoted Secretary of Defense (and former Marine Corps Commandant) James Mattis: "But the Marine Corps has always been more Eastern-oriented. Sadly, Putin can **act** on his understanding while Mattis will have to **educate** his boss as to why Sun Tzu's insights are important.

The search for news from all points on the political spectrum continues and remains a critical activity.

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Readers will remember that in the 2016 Presidential election I voted for Gary Johnson. One of the reasons I did so was that Johnson was the only candidate who identified our national debt as a critical issue and made debt reduction a major campaign plank. Johnson did not win (a) and the debt issue has not gone away. My friend John T forwarded an e-mail to me from the Heritage Foundation (conservative think tank / activist organization). One of the sub-headlines read It's time to stop overspending and overborrowing. Congress is running out of time to pass a budget resolution. It needs to reach a budget deal by Sept 30, about the same time it will need to reach a deal to raise the nation's borrowing limit. "Nearing \$20 trillion, and larger than annual U.S. economic product, the only responsible choice in dealing with our national debt is to pursue spending controls before raising the debt ceiling again," says Romina Boccia, Heritage's Grover M. Hermann research fellow. "It is both morally and economically wrong to continue burdening younger generations with overspending and overborrowing without first adopting spending reforms to right the fiscal course."

I have signed up for e-mail newsletter updates from the Heritage Foundation and at some point will advise if I find their communications informative enough to be included in my "news sources" list.

One statistic is undeniable. The higher the % of net government debt to national GDP the greater the risk of fiscal calamity, including inability to honor debt payments without severe inflation. The country with the worst ratio (net government debt to national GDP) is Greece (155%). The United States is 10th (88%). Countries worse than us include Lebanon (134%), Portugal (112%) and Italy (103%). Countries better than us include Denmark (8%), Turkey (28%) and Canada (37%). The last time we had a one year balanced Federal budget was during Bill Clinton's second term, ~20 years ago. Rather than the pointless discussion about the debt ceiling we need to be discussing ways to reduce the deficit. Federal debt is real debt – the money will have to be paid. The only way to reduce this debt load is to reduce spending. We cannot tax ourselves out of debt. Perhaps some tax increases may help but it is spending reduction that is most important. Spending reduction.
