

Dr. Frederick Bates 1857-1920

In addition to his prominence as a medical professional, Frederick Bates was a noted community organizer and played a significant role in chronicling Elmhurst's history.

Born in Elmhurst on October 8, 1857, Bates opened his medical practice in 1884. His combination home and office was located on the southwest corner of York Street and Park Avenue until he had the structure moved to Cottage Hill Avenue in 1913.

Bates was village clerk from 1885 to 1886 and village trustee from 1886 to 1887 and 1894 to 1896. He was also a member of the school board, president of the Building and Loan Association and treasurer of the Electric Light Company. He organized Elmhurst's first library and helped found the Elmhurst Spring Water Company. In 1890, this company supplied Elmhurst residents with running water for the first time.

Bates wrote a series of articles about the history of Elmhurst which first ran in the Elmhurst Press and was later published as a booklet called, "Old Elmhurst."
