Over 500 artists from across the state submitted designs for the medallions, which will memorate the upcoming 200th anniversary of the United States and illustrate Illinois' contribution to America's national heritage. The competition was restricted to residents and former residents of Illinois.

Sponsored by The Franklin Mint of Franklin Center, Pa., the competition was judged by a five-man panel chosen by the Illinois Bicentennial Commission. In addition to McNally, other judges were William K. Alderfer, state historian; Dr. Paul M. Angle, past director of the Chicago Historical Society and noted Lincoln scholar; Paul J. Randolph, Ill. State Representative (12th-Chicago); and Gardner H.

Burnside's winning design showing a young, tousled-haired Abe

Lincoln-will be produced by Franklin in sterling silver and in-cluded in a set of bicentennial commemorative medals featuring at the first prize designs from each of the fifty states. The Illinois Bicentennial Commission will receive a 5 per cent share from all sales of the privately-produced set in the state. The collection will go into production late this year, according to The Franklin Mint.

The competition was Burnside's first attempt at medallion work, although he previously won several2 prizes for his watercolors in cexhibitions in the Chicago and Philadelphia areas. He is a com-

A native of Philadelphia, "The Cradle of Liberty," Burnside now resides in Elmhurst with his wife, Shirley, and his three children: Sarah, 7; Lee, 5; and Peter, 7 months.

Burnside adopted his winning design from a rare 1857 portrait of Abraham Lincoln, Lincoln, Burnside said, is Illinois' all-time outstanding

citizen. The portrait, originally intended to decorate a campaign poster, was never used. Burnside discovered a reproduction while researching Lincoln in the Elmhurst Public Library.

ful felt this tousled-haired portrait was most appropriate, especially with the emphasis on youth at this time," Burnside said. The beardless design is especially appropriate, also, because Lincoln never wore a beard while living in Illinois, and in fact grew it after being elected president in 1860.
